



# "Thy Rocks and Rills, Thy Woods and Templed Hills" by Herbert C. Miller, M.D.

These words, written in 1832 by the Reverend Samuel Francis Smith of Boston as part of his hymn to America, aptly describe the small inland town of North Branford that celebrates its Sesquicentennial this June. Much of the livelihood of North Branford Inhabitants, as they were referred to in the early Town Records, depended then, as it does now, on its rocks and rills and templed hills. The Town's use of the land has undergone profound changes from its first settlement about 1700 to its present day status as one of southern Connecticut's rural suburbs. But the old homes, dating from the early 1700's, continue to remind us of stalwart families who tilled the rocky soil, harnessed its streams, believed in the value of steady habits, independence, and education, and in Almighty God.

By the time the Town was incorporated in 1831, the Inhabitants had long converted the wilderness into farms that produced grains, dairy products, and cider brandy for the international markets in addition to home consumption. Bayberries were in such demand in the foreign trade that the Town, in 1717, imposed a fine of ten shillings on anyone caught picking bayberries along the highways before September 15. Timber from its woodlands was used in building ships in Fair Haven. Located on the Town's two main streams, the Branford and Farm Rivers, were grist mills, fullers' mills, sawmills, tanneries, bone and potash mills, carriage shops and ice houses. The first four-wheel wagon in Connecticut is said to have been built in North Branford. Fine saddles, harnesses, and axe handles were also produced during the colonial period.

While the Inhabitants were developing farms and building mills, some of them aspired to higher education with the help of their learned ministers and the benefits of their one-rool school houses, epitomized by The Little Red School House built in 1805. The latter has been restored to its pristine state, serving as the museum of the Totoket Historical Society, and remains as the fourth oldest Little Red School House in Connecticut. The Inhabitants' concern for higher education came from their Puritan ancestors of whom A.L. Rowse of Oxford University wrote that the incidence of university graduates from Oxford and Cambridge was much higher among Puritans than among the population of Old England. Samuel Elliot Morrison of Harvard stated, "... the dominant Puritan clergy, far from being indifferent to culture... did everything possible to stimulate, promote, and even produce, intellectual activity." The early Congregational ministers of North Branford were graduates of Yale College.

Some had been tutors at the College; some served as Fellows of the Yale Corporation. They tutored the young people of North Branford, many of whom also became Yale graduates. One young lady, Lucinda Foote, was tutored so well that President Stiles of Yale gave her a certificate stating she was fully prepared to enter Yale College, had the rules allowed admission of ladies. One of the graduates of The Little Red School House, Mary Foote, was the first woman admitted to the Connecticut Bar. In his *Memorial Discourse*, delivered in 1876, the Reverend A.C. Pierce said, "Few parishes in the State and perhaps none of equal population, have given to the world so large a number of liberally educated men . . . who have served their generation in the varied fields of professional labor . . ."

It can be debated as to whether "Yankee ingenuity" was fostered by high intelligence or by the long winters and rocky soil of New England, which gave the self-sustaining householders ample time and reason to tinker. In any case, the Town had more than its share of Yankee ingenuity, clearly demonstrated with the coming of the Industrial Revolution. The number of inventions that came out of North Branford in the nineteenth century is astounding. Chapman Maltby's coconut dippers (\$3.50 a dozen) were much in demand, and his shredded dry coconut, which won him a first prize at Philadelphia's Centennial Exposition in 1876, almost made North Branford "the shredded coconut capital of the world," according to E.C. May in his book, "A Century of Silver, 1847-1947."

The inventions of Maltby Fowler and his six sons included machines for making buttons, pocket combs, perforated tinware, drawing out brass tubing, screws at the rate of 6,000 per minute, cigars, cigarettes,

pins, hairpins, horseshoe nails, tin lamps, platinum rivets to hold false teeth in their plates, and washing machines. The Branford and Farm Rivers produced the water power that turned the wheels of many small factories. Not all succeeded. Thelus Todd, who was a cattle dealer, farmer, and ran a grist mill with his son on a branch of Farm River, decided to put up a mill to make wrapping paper, much in demand during the Civil War. After building and equipping it with expensive machinery, he found there was not enough water power to run it. His ingenuity, however, found a way. He traded his house and mill for David Stevens house and mill on the Quinnipiac River. Stevens was making flatware. Todd found the Quinnipiac provided the power needed for his paper manufacture and Stevens got enough power out of Farm River to produce his flatware. Meanwhile, Stevens' two sons, David Jr. and Henry, began a card manufacturing business, making Christmas cards, valentines, and "sparking" cards as well as business cards, with such success that Northford, a village of North Branford, became known as the 'Christmas card center of the world," in the words of E.C. May.

A horse-drawn hay rake is the centerpiece of the logo marking North Branford's Sesquicentennial this year. The first patent for this device was issued to Smith & Cowles Co. of North Branford in 1861. The machine symbolizes North Branford as a farming community and as a nineteenth-century manufacturing town. Towards the end of that century, the manufacturing moved to larger cities on larger rivers in Connecticut in order to meet the growing demands for their products. The local mills and factories gradually disappeared and only traces of their foundations remain. The Town's one brown-stone quarry played out in the middle of the nineteenth-century. The number of Inhabitants dropped from 1000 in 1880 to 800 by the next census and remained so for thirty more years. Farming once more became the chief occupation.

After these thirty years, North Branford moved forward once more with the help of its rocks and rills. In 1913, a quarry on North Branford's Totoket Mountain was started by the New Haven Trap Rock Co. and is now the world's largest single-face quarry, two miles long. This was followed in 1926 by the purchase of one-third of the land area of the Town by the New Haven Water Co. and the formation of Lake Gaillard. This body of water with a storage capacity of 16,000 million gallons provided the Company with a five-fold increase in its total storage capacity. The Company was transferred in 1980 to public ownership under the South Central Connecticut Regional Water Authority, and now serves 375,000 people in twelve neighboring cities and towns. Following World War II, the migration of city dwellers to North Branford's countryside made it the fastest growing town in Connecticut during the sixties. The town government was changed from a selectmen-town meeting type to a council-city manager type in 1971. That same year, North Branford received an award from the National Municipal League naming it an "All American City."

### HISTORICAL DAY

Displays of local history and artifacts will be in the Center School (Old Administration Building) behind the present Town Hall. Members of the Totoket Historical Society will be present to explain the exhibits and to answer questions. Mrs. Janet Gregan will be in charge of this day.

The Little Red School House will also be open for viewing. It is located on Old Post Road in Northford across from William Douglas School. The date June 25, time 1-4 p.m., 7-8 p.m. Admission free.

### CONCERT

The Sesquicentennial Celebration Chorus will be presented in Concert Wednesday and Thursday June 24th and 25th at the North Branford High School at 8:00 p.m.

Come and enjoy an evening of musical variety with songs spanning 30 years.

Included in the program will be soloists, instrumentalists as well as a singalong led by a quartet of Choristers and much, much, more.

General admission will be \$1.25 and .75 for students and senior citizens.
