### Timothy Russell Palmer - Journal 1828

[January 1828 begins in a new book, 61/2 inches by 7 1/2 inches with marblelized gray and pink paper cover. The cover is ripped and the spine is worn. There are a few columns of figures on both front and back.

Inside front cover is divided into 8 blocks with a name at the top of each. Some blocks have a column of numbers underneath the name. Names are: J. Bunnell & Wife; Luzern Bunnell; Ophana Beers; Jane Beers; Lois Barker; Jerusha Baldwin; Jared Chedsey & Wife; Eliza P. Chedsey.

There are two sections enclosed by the cover. The first section has 14 sheets 12 3/8 inches by 7 3/4 inches folded in half making 28 double sided pages. The second section contains 7 folded sheets, the same size, with 14 double sided pages - a total of 70 pages. Neither section appears to have been sewn.

The inside of the back cover contains a sketched floor plan of a building. The four words written there are unintelligible and don't seem to have any relationship to the drawing.

The paper used for the first several pages in the first section is rather porous and the ink bleeds through to the other side making it difficult to read Of course the paper does the same on the last pages of the first section.]

#### January 1829

Tues. I Jan 1828 — The commencement of a new year can hardly (fail to) [words blotted out] produce on the mind a train of serious reflections. It is a time when the reflecting mind cannot avoid a retrospective view of the past. [line blocked out] Months and years gone — improved or misinproved, past forever. It is a time if rightly improved calculated to inspire one with seriousness, to consider the uncertainty oflife — the speedy flight of time, and the certainty that it will soon be gone — I wonder many times that any can feel disposed to commence a new year in the thoughtless manner which is so common. viz. by dancing & carousing — it seems unappropriate to do

Solemn an occasion — I have often thought the Methodist denomination were the most rational as it respects the manner of closing & commencing a year. The time when the last sands of the closing year are running out, & a new year is commencing how rational to be engaged in Prayer and expressions of Devotion — but it is a time when little else is thought of by many than its pleasures and amusements of the ballroom and carousing — and (joking") with & thoughtless frivolity, tell the state of (foolish?) hearts — Many who profess religion seem to like delight also, in the circles of the gay & irreligious — Tis wonderful that man can be so thoughtless — When lives is on the wing

During the past year a good degree of health has been enjoyed here -- no (preversity?) epidemic has appeard -- 11 Persons have died all except 3 upwards of 50 years -- Much occasion for gratitude to God -- for his protection his (?less) love --

The wether not cold -- some cloudy -- I carry the coffin of Mr Chittendens in fant to (Giles?) -- Prayer Meeting -- I not attend few there Deac. Russell officiates -- solemnly at funeral -- Thus the year commences --

Wen 2 Jan 1828 Cloudy constantly and much Rain - Very rainy season -

.lllYrsJ. I much hurried -- Warm Wet.

Fri 4 we have had but little snow a few hours of sleighing

Mon 28 Jan 1828 Clear windy weather I work in shop

Tues 29 Pleasant for January -- no snow yet -- Uncommon wether

Thurs 31 Warm pleasant -- Cloudy -- This Ends January 1828 --

Fri 1 Feb. 1828 Pleasant day -- warm seems like April-- I work in shop --

Sab 3d Feb 1828 Cloudy dull day -- muddy indeed -- Mr Arms Preachd -- Morning text Romans 3rd. 22nd "for there is no difference" Afternoon text from Matthew 5th 47th "What do ye more than others" Solemn good discourse-- how the text applies to Christians' how little do they do -- foggy wet -- Dull wether

Mon 4th Beautiful spring day -- uncommon winter, frost about out of the ground I at home reading History of England

Tue 5 Cloudy Rainy muddy -- unhealthy wether - (favorable?) for colds & influenser

Wed 6 Cloudy rainy -- dreadful muddy Our club meet. I attend -- A Meeting for the choice of deligates which are to meet at N. Haven to nominate senators, held at I. Russell

Thurs. 7 Continues muddy and rainy -- dull time

Fri 8 Clears off -- Pleasant cool -- I spend my Evenings in reading History of England --

Sat 9 Cloudy yet

Sab 10th Feb. 1828 Cloudy unpleasant — Mr Arms Preaches Morning text in Luke 46th 31 "If they hear not Moses and &c. after noon text in Ps. 34th 14 V. depart from evil and do good" good. Preaching Muddy walking indeed — I walk & return

Man 11 th I engaged in shop - Cloudy - attend Library Meeting this Evening A tax of 25 cts laid - I draw books - a party at Widow (Hanes? Howes?) I stop a moment but retire --

Tues 12th. Pleasant -- This Evening I go to Mr Fords -- a small company of girls there -- I attend Nancy Hull home -- return about half past 1 Oclock -- Cold some --

Wen 13 Cold windy day -- March Wether I work in shop this Evening -- (Candie?) party to D. Butlers I not go ---

Thur 14 Windy cold -- Cloudy some I turn I some hurried -- dark nights -- no snow--

Fri 15. I at work in shop -- reading &c.

Sat 16 Clear and pleasant day for this season

Sab 17 February 1828 Fine day as ever dawned pleasant spring day -- warm -- Mr Arms preaches -- first text in Provo 3 Chap. 12th Verse "Happy is the man that findeth wisdom" - Afternoon text in Eccl. 12th 1 V. "Remember now thy creator &C." A discourse to the young -- in which he shows the importance of early piety -- excellent discourse -- Elihu Linsley jun. Published -- This Evening I go to Capt. Russells -- return about 8 -- muddy walking -- Sylvia & Lodeemy foot and others at our house -- a prospect of rain -- dark & muddy indeed

Man 18 Cloudy and rains -- South storm

Tues 19 Pleasant beautiful day -- Uncommon time -- equilly warm as April -- No frost in ground -- heavy rain fell last night - This Evening Elihu Linsley Married

Wen 20. Pleasant -- I Idle too much Miss N. Hull leaves Branford -- She appears to be an amiable virtuous girl-but feeling dissatisfied with some of her conduct I do not regret her departure much --

Some cloudy -- This the most singular Winter ever known or rememberd by any now on the stage We have had no snow and but little frost in the ground -- This I spend at I. Russells -- company enough there too frequently is the bar room crowded, too much dissipation

Thur 21. Feb. 1828 -- Rains again -- South wind -- Dancing has become common -- much time is thus foolishly spent -- I cannot look upon this amusement with the least degree of approbation since it is unquestionably attended, by dissipation and habits, pernicious in their effects, to Society, injurious and corrupting to the morals of the young -- Oh when will the vain amusements of this short life cease

[The entries for Fri 22 to Sab 24 are crossed out from this point to the bottom of the page. A section about one inch wide has been cut from the top of the next page.]

Thurs 21 continued -- This Evening I go to Josiah Frisbees with chairs -- Singing School in the paved Street school House -- I attend -- very much pleased with the Singing return with the Rose girls -- and go to Thomas Frisbees with Lucy Cooper and Charlotte R. -- Elihu Linsley married this Evening -- after refreshing ourselves with wine &c all returned home about 1 oclock -- pleasant moon light but dreadful wet and muddy -- Lodeemy Monroe taken sick of Typhus Fever at S. Foots -- dangerous some fear--

<u>Fr. 22</u> Pleasant day — mud drys some — This evening I attend the Religious Meeting in Pave street School House — Mr. Gillet present — his discourse from the parable of the rich man and Lazarus — excellent indeed — enjoy myself well — Pleasant moon light night — Cool— I go to S. Foots to see Lodeemy — her sick — return home about 10 — enjoy myself better then last (night?)

Fri 22 Not so pleasing --

Sab 24th 1828 Cloudy dull — Mr. Marsh Preacher — Morning text in Romans 1 Chap 16 Verse. For I am not ashamed of the Gospel of &c." After noon text in 2 Cor. 4th C. 3 V. "For if our gospel is hid &c." excellent preaching I'm well entertained indeed — solemn Oh how important is Religion to every individual — begins to snow about two Oclock — Stormy Evening —

Mon 25 Clears off cold -- some snow fell last night -- moderate sleighing the first and best we have had -- Societies Meeting The report of the Committee for seating the Meeting House read and accepted -- I at home this Evening-- cold light--

Tues 26. Warm Sleighing going off Cloudys up towards night rains some goes fast -- I at home this Evening

Wen 27, bad traveling wet footings

Thurs 28th 1828 Feb. I laying chamber floor -- fixing up (Kitchen?) -- Pleasant day This day William R. draws his shop good luck indeed -- Snow entirely gone

Fri 29th Squally March day -- cold -- This Ends Feb. 1828 Windy wether -- Lodeemy Monroe recovering from sickness

Sat 1. March 1828. Pleasant cool day -- I reading (Bowden's?) letters to Mr. Miller on the (divine?) and (Laity?) of Episcopay Moon light nights -- Pleasant --

Sab 2nd Cloudy unpleasant morning -- begins to snow about 9 Oclock -- snows lightly Mr. Arms Our Preacher to day -- morning text in James 5 Chap -- 12th Verse. "But above all things my Brethren swear not &c." good sermon but not many present -- after noon text in Ps. 7th 11th V. God is angry with the wicked every day" -- solemn subject quite stormy rainy -- uncomfortable walking -- I spend the Evening at home reading

Man 3rd. March. 1828 Clear sqully [sic] March wether -- I make a settee for Doct. Lay -- cloudy sqully [sic]-- Lodeemy recovers --

<u>Tues 4.</u> March wether -- disagreeable Lodeemy Monroe so much recover'd as to come to our House -- after spending two weeks at S Foote and being throwed on to the Town -- a thing which I totally disapproved

Wed 5 Pretty pleasant to day but cold -- I paint chairs &c. Yesterday P. Harrison appointed Taverner -- at a special Meeting This Evening Our Club Meet no business done I fife with William Baldwin -- drum retire after 12 Oclock -- Cool Evening--

-- How important it is that proper restraints should be put upon the conduct of the young How should parents, masters, Guardians, and all whom have the care of youth discountenance habits of Idleness profanity intemperance &c. -- School Masters certainly have it in their power to exert over those placed under them and how important that they should be means of piety -- at least good Morals --

I have been led to serious contemplations on account of the prevalence of card playing among the schoolars of Capt. Linsleys school Instructor of the Center district school—I can not look upon it with indifference—that they should be engaged from the youngest to the oldest constantly during the intermission and on every occasion in this employing Themselves and this permitted and thus sanctioned by this teacher is enough to excite ( storm? ) in the breath of all who feel the importance of training up the young in the way they should go—No more of this

Thur 6th 1828 March Cloudy -- a skim of snow fell last night -- goes off --

Harrison spend the Evening with Abigail H. — return home about 3 Oclock — This young lady appears very well— steady and virtuous —

Mon April. 7th 1828 Cold windy day Town Meeting I attend -- Federal Majority Ammi Baldwin & Ralph Linsley to represent this town -- return home tired

Tues 8th Continues cold and blustering Cold frosty nights -- we fear for peach blossoms a buds -- grass green quite

Wen 9th Wether moderates some but cool I at work in shop painting &c. -- I at home

Thur 10 I painting sign for E. Barker to day Died this night Widow Thankful Smith in Poor house AE 71 Yrs. — lived at Damascus

Dancing this Evening at Byingtons again -- Oh! how different would be the conduct of children should parents exhibit a proper example -- what restraints would be imposed -- but alas how do parents err

Fri 11. April 1828. I paint sign part of the day -- after noon I attend the Funeral she buried at Damascus -- Church service read -- Evening at home &c. --

<u>Sat 12th.</u> some cloudy unpleasant I finish E. Barkers sign -- Gen. Harrisons Horse Shed painted -- it so situated as to obscure my prospect entirely -- I am not pleased at all
