Comments: Medad's Notes and Journal of 1768 to 1783 were copied, corrected and finally typed June 5, 1997. Underlined words represent a best guess at Medad's written word and a blank line represents a failure to interpret.

When first copying the notes and diary, the 18 neatly packaged notes, measuring about 3" X 4", were thought to be the sermons given to Yale and referred to in Samuel Rogers' letter of November 9, 1901. They were set aside. A revisit to the original papers for the purpose of checking the chronology of several entries resulted in a decision to not peruse the papers for fear of further damage. Instead, a quick review of the neatly packaged notes revealed not sermons, but additional diaries in a very neat but fine handwriting. These consisted of Medad's notes made during his adult life from 1786 to 1819.

The monumental tablet erected by his flock to his memory says, in part :--

70:

He had strong powers of mind; was bold in defence of the truth; severe against wickedness; mild towards the humble; pitiful to the distressed; affectionate towards his friends.

Frank and sincere in all his professions; rational and fervent in his piety; faithful in his pastoral duties.

¹ MEDAD ROGERS, son of Deacon Josiah Rogers, of North Branford, Connecticut, and an elder brother of Timothy Rogers (Yale 1774), was born in North Branford on August 17, 1750.

Portions of an interesting diary kept by him during the last three years of his College course are in the Yale Library; as also fragments of a similar diary in 1778, including a period of about eight weeks spent on a privateer sailing from New London, and a series of later diaries during the next forty years.

In 1779-So he studied theology with the Rev. Dr. Benjamin Trumbull (Yale 1759), of North Haven, Connecticut, whose paternal kindness won his deep gratitude. He was licensed to preach by the New Haven Association of Ministers on May 30, 1780. He first preached for some time in Salem Society, now Naugatuck, Connecticut, and received a call to settle in January, 1781. He is next heard of in New Lebanon, New York, and thence he went to Hardwick, Worcester County, Massachusetts, and on June 3, 1784, the Congregational Church there gave him a unanimous call to the pastorate. This call was confirmed by the vote of the town on June 23, but the salary offered (\pounds So) was not considered by him as adequate. 704

Further negotiations resulted in his acceptance, and a council was called for ordination on October 13; but for some reason not now understood the transaction was then broken off. Another call was given him, later in October, by the church, and was seconded by the town in January, 1785, but without avail. After this he supplied the newly gathered church in North Cornwall, Connecticut.

In October, 1786, he accepted a call to the South Society in New Fairfield, Fairfield County, Connecticut, where he was ordained and installed on November 29. The society was small in number, but they signalized their welcome of the new minister by building a new meeting-house.

In the earlier years of his ministry he had many discouragements, but a noted revival of religion occurred in 1818, by which the whole community was moved, and upwards of one hundred persons were added to the church. He was dismissed in October, 1822, and died in New

Fairfield on August 25, 1824, at the age of 74.

He married, probably on July 1, 1787, Rachel Baldwin, of Kent, Connecticut, daughter of the late Gamaliel Baldwin, of New Milford and that part of New Fairfield which is now Sherman. Their children were two sons (of whom the elder died in infancy) and two daughters. The surviving son was the father of Samuel T. Rogers (Yale 1844).

His diaries and portions of his manuscript correspondence with the Rev. Dr. Trumbull, now in the Yale Library, give a marked impression of piety, humility, and earnest Christian devotion.


PEDIGREE CHART 30 Apr 1995

Dear Sir;-

Your kind favour of the 3rd instant was

duly received, and yesterday Dr. Stiles' very interesting Diary came to hand, for which please accept my heartiest thanks. I promise myself much pleasure in 'its perusal.

I shall send you the diary of lily grand-

father, Medad Rogers Class of 1777, in a week or so. My daughter will bring it so that it may reach you safely. It may be of intereston account of an accurate, though simple record of facts relating to

the college, town matters, etc., in the last, third of the 18th century. I shall retain a portion of the diary relating to his pastorate in the rural town of New Fairfield, where he was installed over the church for 40 years, at the meagre salary of £100.00 per year. and the use of a few acres of parsonage lands. He studied for the ministry under the tutelage of Benjamin Trumbull of North Haven, boarding at his own house in Northford, town of Branford, Ct. Benjamin Trumbull, Johnathan Edwards, and the Rev. Mr. Langdon of Danbury, were present and assisted at the installation, as the church records of New Fairfield show. Medad Rogers built his own house, and

superintended the building of his church at the same time. His farm consisted of three small adjoining farms totaling some 100 acres, On

this f'arm he worked like a common laborer, 5 1/2 days each week and

wrote his sermons on Saturday nights extending past the midnight, hour. He was a Puritan of the Puritans. At set of sun on Saturdays, all work must cease on the farm and in the house. all food for the Sabbath must be cooked before the set of Saturday's sun, boots blacked, face shaved, etc. It seems difficult to imagine that one could live a lifetime' of

74 ,years under such hard and fast rules, but so it was, as I have every reason to

believe according to my father's and aunts' repeated statements to me. He died in 1824 when I was four years Old. My

recollections of him are, of course, quite filmy. He did not write

learned sermons, a fact to be expected in the limited time allotted to them, but they were probably worth more than the salary he received for this service. As a matter of fact, shown by the Church Records, he repeatedly remitted part of the £100:00 per year If you wish, I may be able to get some sermons of his for the library. The upper ha; If of the sermons on the front page was removed for record when and where it was preached. Exchanges of pulpits were rife in those primitive days. It saved brain work though it added to travel, and this travel, be it noted must be done on Saturday, P.M. before sunset.

One of my grandfather's diaries, referring to the time of his Studying Divinity and Theology with Benjamin Trumbull, I regret to state is not to be found. In it I remember he shows that Miss Patty Trumbull had attracted him very seriously, but the attraction was not

Mutual. She afterwards married the Rev. Mr. Woodward, as I was informed by her nephew, Mr. David Bishop, first Mayor of Waterbury, Ct.

The diaries relating to my grandfather's pastorate in New Fairield, I do not send in the first installment since I wish to have a copy of them made first. I give these diaries to the University believing that they may contain some facts of interest and value.

My' grandfather's instructor at Yale lies buried here in Bridgeport in its oldest cemetery. He was Nehemiah Strong, M.A., Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy.




