

- Johnson Oak, said to be the largest and oldest white oak in the United States.
 Red School House, built 1805. Among noted graduates is Mary France from the control of Company and Compan
- Mary Foote, first woman lawyer of Connecticut.

 3. Indian Hill, where the Pistapaugh Indians lived. Old Indian
- Indian Hill, where the Pistapaugh Indians lived. Old Indian oven, stone basins used for grinding corn, record of the braves who fought in the French and Indian Wars, other Indian souvenirs.
- Sol's Path, 1680, the first dwelling built in Northford and the oldest building standing today within the limits of the original Branford. Indian well where white men and Indians first bartered.

 5. Warham Williams House, the first parsonage of the Congregational Church, now the rectory of St. Andrew's Parish. An
- outstanding example of New England Colonial architecture. Its doorway has only two counterparts, one of which is in the Metropolitan Museum, New York City. This house has been completely furnished with antiques and throughout the summer will be open for inspection at a nominal Ice.
- 6-7. Toll Gates. The entrances to Northford have been appropriately marked by replicas of the toll gates that stood in approximately their present positions upon the completion of the Middletown Turnpike in 1812.
- 8. Rising Sun Tavern, 1736.
- 9. Three Tavern Corner (original buildings still standing).
- 10. Warner Homestead. The public is invited to view a permanent Art Exhibit on display.
