AN INVENTORY OF THE REAL & PERSONAL ESTATE OF JONATHAN FOOT NOVEMBER 1,1813

Origin:

The inventory is one item in a donation of 69 manuscripts pertaining to the Foot/Chidsey/Barker families made by Vera Phillipi in December, 1994. The remaining items are stored in a gray drop front box in Cabinet 1 of Vault 1.

Historical Background:

A fair amount is known about Jonathan Foot from other sources including the other manuscripts in the Vera Phillipi Accession and from Cemetery records.

Jonathan Foot was born in 1765, in the section of Branford that was to become North Branford. He married Esther Russell in April 1792. They had three sons; John, Walter and Merit. Jonathan was Vestryman of the newly formed Zion Episcopal Church in 1812-1813 when the Rev. Elijah Plumb was its first Rector. Jonathan died, Intestate, on July 13,1813. His wife Esther was named Administrator by the Probate Court in Guilford. Their son John died in January 1835, one month before Esther. Jonathan, Esther and John are buried side by side in the North Branford Cemetery. Early maps of the town show the location of his house on Twin Lakes Road.

Physical Description of the Inventory:

The inventory is written in a hand-made ledger with overall dimensions of 13"H x 4.5" W. The cover is made of a sheet of coarse brown paper folded to give a double thickness, closed at the rear cover but open at the front. The inventory is written on three sheets of better quality paper, 12.25"H x 7.5"W. The pages are folded vertically and sewn down the middle, together with the cover. This produces a booklet with 12 pages of text, each one 12.25"H x 3.75"W.

The inventory is written in black ink and is generally clear and legible. Since the book had been folded in storage, the text pages were partially or completely torn along the fold line. The book was flattened and the tears were repaired with Filmoplast P tape. Other than these tears, the inventory is in very good condition. The inventory is stored in a box made of acid-free board in Cabinet 1 of Vault 1.

Discussion:

The inventory of Jonathan Foot's Estate is interesting for several reasons. Dating from 1813, it is one of the oldest surviving financial records of a North Branford resident. It is part of a larger manuscript donation which amplifies and confirms much of the information in the inventory. It is also unusually detailed (228 items) and legible. The format and the sewn binding make it clear that there are no missing pages. Finally, the completeness of the inventory, with values assigned to each item, makes it possible to reconstruct with reasonable confidence, many aspects of the life of Jonathan Foot.

The following paragraphs contain some of the more obvious conclusions and comments that can be drawn from the inventory.

First, consider the date, November 1st, 1813. Jonathan Foot died 15 weeks before, on July 13, 1813. The country was at war with Britain. A war that was extremely unpopular in New England whose economy had been crippled by the shipping embargo and blockade imposed by the belligerents. The war was so unpopular that the governors of Massachusetts and Connecticut had forbidden their militias to participate in a planned invasion of Canada. How did the war affect Jonathan Foot? Probably, very little. As a small, self-sufficient farmer he was well insulated from the economic distortions caused by the blockade. However, the price he could get for his surplus produce would have dropped and the cost of imported goods, even sugar from New Orleans would have soared.

Looking now at the Inventory itself, (See Table 1 for a summary) we see that the total value of his estate was \$4,668.21. Jonathan Foot was a moderately prosperous farmer who owned 124 acres of farmland and two small salt meadows. He raised hay, oats, corn, flax and potatoes. He also had an apple orchard. He owned four dairy cows and made cheese. He also raised hogs and sheep, presumably for the market. He owned a horse drawn wagon and an ox cart. His most highly valued livestock was a pair of oxen.

As a farmer, his largest single asset was his land which represented 72% of his total estate. The value of his house and other buildings was relatively low at only \$368 or 8% of the total. It is interesting that the barn was worth only \$80 while the produce and livestock stored in the barn were worth \$517. It seems likely that the inventory taken on November 1st gives a good estimate of the annual production of the farm. By that date the harvest should have been in the barn while the yearling animals had not yet been slaughtered. The value of the produce in the barn plus the animals destined for the market was about \$280. This would give an annual return of 8% on the value of the land which seems reasonable.

His house had three bedrooms containing four beds, three of which had trundle-beds underneath. There was a kitchen and a dining room with separate tables and chairs in each. The dining room furniture was of cherry wood At a time when homespun cloth was the norm in rural households, it is interesting to see the high value put on linens. The value of the sheets, towels, quilts and tablecloths was \$98 while Mr. Foot's clothing and personal possessions were worth only \$47. For example, a pair of silver knee buckles was valued at only \$0.75 while a pair of sheets was worth \$3.50.

There are some interesting omissions from the inventory. There is no mention of cash on hand nor of bank accounts nor of any other financial assets. It seems strange that a man whose farm produced \$300 per year had no money in the house. With the harvest in but not yet sold the cash level was probably at the low point of the year. Also, some cash was used to settle outstanding debts prior to submitting the inventory. Finally, this may reflect the impact of the war on farm prices and on the general economy of New England.

There is no mention of a watch and only a wooden wheeled clock listed with the barn implements.

There were only 5 books, all of a serious nature.

The only hints of luxury were silver knee buckles, a set of silver coat buttons and a set of silver spoons.

For diversion, there was a "reel", perhaps hinting at some fishing. There were also "two old guns" which may indicate hunting.

In summary, after studying the inventory, one is left with the impression of a life dedicated to hard work, in reasonable comfort, but with little sign of luxury or frivolity.

The following pages contain a transcription and a photocopy of the full text of the inventory.

There is also a Table listing other, related documents in the archives of the Totoket Historical Society.
