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### Timothy Russell Palmer - Journal 1825

January 1 st 1825 Sat The wether cloudy — warm — Seems like Snow — I do but little work — This Commences a new Year Through the unspeakable goodness of God I am permitted to live — Others are cut off in the morning of their days — in youth I cannot be sufficently thankful for the mercies which I recieve'd the good God the past year— I have live'd unworthyly Oh! what can I render to God for his goodness — I have been stupid and vile - Cold and indifferent concerning the religion of Jesus — May God forgive me & help me to live more consistently with my holy professions — The numbers of Deaths which have taken among us is 9 -

Two at the age of 73 the remaining generally young — Who are singled out as the victims this year time alone will unfold! - Cloudy

Dear Lord, if it is enrolled in the book of thy ( 1) of me "This year thou shalt die," O Wilt thou graciously fit me for the event? Enable me to gird up the loins of my mind to grow in grace and ripen for the celestial World. O grant me a (meetness?) for glory."

Mon 7. pleasant -- Snow goes off -- I attend the Concert of prayer few present -- Chauncey Russell arraigned before Esq. Baldwin and bound over to County Court Sleighs go quick -- (impose?) the time -- Lem'l sleeps with me healthy now here --

Tues. 8 Feb. 1825 Cold today Snow gone about — I making Chairs — Oh how different the feelings which possess my breast now from what they were when first I felt the light of Gods countenance beam upon me — alas! all now is dark and dismal compar'd with those bright moments when religion first dawned upon me! Little Sleep I get to night

Sab 13 Pleasant tho Cloudy & muddy quite -- No preaching Deac. conduct the service few at meeting -- Clears off after noon -- No Meet, this Evening I at Capt Russells -- spend the Eve. there -- stay late -- 3 Oclock home --

MQn. 14 pleasant day -- I do little work -- muddy time Library Meet. -- Mr. Atwater dangerously sick -

<u>Tues 15</u> Cloudy -- warm muddy I go with Lemuel Harrison to New Haven -- buy a flute &c. play this Evening &c. --

Wen 16 pleasant -- muddy

Mr Atwater dangerously Sick Very distress'd family indeed

Thur 17 Feb 1825 I painting sign for I. Russell &c. -- This day the body of Mr Burger remove from the grave yard in Mill plane to the Church yard in this place 4 months since his decease -- -- The grave of Zeron Richards open'd also -- spend the Eveing fluting

Sat 18 pleasant Spring day Mr Atwater appears to be nigh his End -- the fever rages -- -- This Evening I go with Lemuel H. to Capt. E. Roses -- flute -- return about 2 Oclock -- he sleeps with me muddy bad walking -- Sap time

Sat 19 This day to work at sign the week past I lie down to sleep --

Sab 20 Some cloudy and very muddy -- Spring wether --

---- 12 Oclock -- just heard from Ms Atwater -- thought to be more revive'd -- 4 Oclock P. M. -- just heard again-he is taken poor now -- thought to be a dying -- distressing -- -- Doct. I. Harrison unable to attend upon him -preach'd this day a young man -- unknown to me -- Morning text in Heb. 9th Chap. 27th V. "And as it is appointed
unto all men &c." Solemn subject. -- After noon text also in Reb. 4 -- 1 Oth "For he that is entered into his rest &c."
I well entertained -- Prayers requested in behalf of Mr. Atwater Daniel Barker Publishd -- no meeting this Evening
-- Mr Atwater fails --

Mon 21 Feb 1825 East Wind blow -- Stormy some I go to G. Asher get his wife to Mr Atwaters bad wether-- some snow - sleety -- Wether becomes more comfortable towards night -- Died at half past 3 oclock P. M. the Rev. Charles Atwater AE 34 years 6 months -- of Typhoid Fever!! -- after preaching to this people about 16 years -- cut down in the vigor of manhood in the prime oflife in the midst of usefulness -- he was much belov'd by his people especially the Church -- We have witnessed his labours his unremited exertions his anxiety his constant desires for the welfare of the Souls committed to his charge. The young members those who Join'd the church under his preaching feel much the Joss -- A more affecting Death never occurred among us -- but we

Consolation of a good hope that our loss is his infinite gain -- George is very sick -

"Bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord — A discourse suited to the Occasion — Sabbath school arrangements made — children class Library Carried and opend at the meeting house — open every Sabbath noon — afternoon text Matthew 7th Chap "as ye would that others do to you do ye even so to them" Thus goes Sabbath after Sabbath! ## Timothy Russell Palmer - Journal 1827

[Timothy Russell Palmer's Journal for 1827 is written in a handmade booklet approxiately 6 1/4 inches wide and 8 inches high. There is no cover or the cover is missing. The first two leaves fold around 5 folded sheets, three single and two doubled The last sheet is slightly smaller than the others. The two outside pages have holes along the center line as if sewn at one time. The inner pages do not. The journal begins at the top of the first exterior page:]
